Exhibition Rules:

- A. Members must participate according to General Junior Fair Rules and Junior Fair Livestock Exhibition Rules. Any exhibitor who has been subject to disciplinary measures by the Agricultural Society or their respective organization and has not fulfilled the requirements will be ineligible to exhibit at the Lucas County Fair.
- B. To exhibit livestock, you must be a program-age member in good standing in your respective 4-H or FFA Club. Verification of this will occur through extension or chapter. Youth may exhibit in both 4-H & FFA, but cannot enroll in the same project through both organizations.
- C. Proof of Ownership: All exhibitors are responsible for complete ownership and showing rights as evidenced by a bill of sale or registration papers. Exhibitors are required to care for and train their animals as outlined in their project books. A bill of sale will need to be brought with you when you check in your animals at the fair. A department head, in conjunction with a Senior Fairboard Director, will have the opportunity to make home visits during the duration of any project, with prior notification to the exhibitor and guardian.
- D. All market animals must be owned and have showing rights and be cared for by the exhibitor. Ownership of an animal is considered lost if, after the possession date of the current year, the animal has been consigned or sold through an auction or any other type of transaction, even if the exhibitor “buys back” their animal.
- E. Breeding animals must be owned or have a signed lease agreement, have showing rights, and be cared for by the exhibitor.
- F. Identification: All tagging will be completed by Sunday evening of move-in to the fair. Tagging costs of \$3.00 per animal for cattle, swine, sheep, and goats will be deducted from the exhibitor’s auction check. Tagging/banding costs of \$3.00 per pen for market rabbits and poultry.
- G. Junior Fair Entry Forms: Junior Fair registration forms are due on May 15 and must be completed online. Any additions or late registrations must be completed by May 22 for a \$50 fee. No registrations or additions may be added after May 22.
- H. All youth must complete the “Livestock Exhibitor Information” form, including their Social Security Number, to be eligible to show.
- I. Quality Assurance: Every exhibitor must complete quality assurance by May 15 to be eligible to participate in the fair. Preferably, it would be completed “in-county” as additional county-level information is provided. Any exceptions must be a workshop approved by Extension and the Senior Fairboard. If completed out of county, the exhibitor is responsible for providing documentation to Extension and the Senior Fairboard.

- J. Drug Use Notification Forms: DUNF must be completed for all market projects. Cattle, sheep, swine, and goats must complete a form for each animal. Rabbits and poultry may complete one form per pen shown. Forms must be completed online by 9 am on Monday. Breeding projects are not required to complete a form.
- K. All animals must comply with show rules and be “exhibition drug residue legal” as of weigh-in Sunday, beginning of fair. All mandatory rules of Ohio Livestock Exhibitors must be followed, as well as optional rules: 901-19-32 & 901-19-35. - L. Animals are only permitted in the immediate area around the livestock barn and the grass area south of the barn along the railroad tracks. Exhibitors taking their animals outside this area are subject to disciplinary action.
- M. Pen Assignments: Shall be made by the Senior Fairboard Director in Charge and department head prior to the livestock on premises. Pen changes are permitted only with the permission of the Senior Fairboard Director, in conjunction with the Department Head.
- N. Arrival Time: All livestock animals must arrive between 8:00 am and 4:00 pm on Sunday before the fair. All livestock will enter through the South Entrance on Key St. Animals will be examined by the official fair veterinarian on Sunday evening and periodically throughout the week.
- O. Departure Time: All livestock animals leave on Sunday, the final day of the fair. No animals may leave early without an Early Release Form submitted to the fair office.
1. 6-6:30- market animals being hauled to market are to move to the swine holding area.
 2. 6:30- market animals being hauled to market are released.
 3. 7 pm- remaining animals are released, and barn cleanup commences.
 4. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning their pens and the surrounding area before leaving.
 5. Department heads must approve your area before leaving; otherwise, a \$100 cleaning fee applies.
- P. Official Weigh-in: Market animals must weigh in between 1:30 & 4:30 on Sunday before the fair. Only one time across the scale is allowed, and that is the official weight. No re-weighs.
- Q. Health Regulations: All livestock exhibits must comply with the current year health regulations prescribed by the State of Ohio Department of Agriculture, Division of Animal Industry (ODA), and the Lucas County Agricultural Society. The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease. Species-specific rules are in the department rules. ODA Rules are available online at [“https://agri.ohio.gov/divisions/animal-health/livestock+exhibitions/livestock-exhibitions.”](https://agri.ohio.gov/divisions/animal-health/livestock+exhibitions/livestock-exhibitions.”) When required, the health certificate must be shown before the animals are unloaded.
- R. The official fair veterinarian, in conjunction with Senior Fairboard Directors in Charge, has final determination on all matters regarding the health and well-being of animals. The official fair veterinarian reserves the right to charge an exhibitor for any medical or surgical supplies dispensed. If an exhibitor desires to use another veterinarian, they must have approval from the Senior Fairboard and the official fair veterinarian.

- S. Drug Testing: The Lucas County Agricultural Society shall have the right to require all Grand & Reserve Champions to be tested.
- T. Champions: All market animals that place Grand or Reserve Champion must go through the Junior Fair Livestock Sale, but the meat is not required to be available for purchase. All Grand and Reserve Market Animals will be tested per ODA requirements. Any exhibitor can receive the Grand and Reserve Champion of any market/breed species.
- U. Livestock Exhibitor Responsibilities:
 - 1. Exhibitors and their families must be courteous and professional. Harassment, profanity, or unsportsmanlike conduct toward fair officials, judges, show managers, help, or other exhibitors will not be tolerated.
 - 2. Exhibitors are responsible for furnishing their own feed, bedding, and supplies. Wood chips or mulch are required for bedding.
 - 3. All animals should be watered and fed before 10 a.m. and 8 p.m. daily.
 - 4. All animals must be clean, properly cared for, and properly groomed for the duration of the fair.
 - 5. Exhibitors will assist with the cleaning of the livestock barn and surrounding area as assigned by the Senior Fair Board Directors in Charge and Department Heads.
 - 6. Exhibitors must show their animals in the market/breed classes.
 - 7. Exhibitor, Ringmaster, Judge, and Junior or Senior Fairboard members assisting are permitted in the ring at the time of judging.
 - 8. If an exhibitor has two animals in the same class, only another active Lucas County Junior Fair youth may show the animal in the respective class.
- V. Violations of any or all rules can result in varying degrees of penalties depending on the violations, including but not limited to a written warning, loss of premium, loss of awards, loss of placing, and being banned from showing. Fairboard Directors in charge of respective Department Heads would inform the Senior Fairboard Executive Board and then interview the related parties to make a recommendation to the Senior Fairboard Executive Board. If necessary, the Executive Board will hear all parties' cases before making a determination.
- W. Grievance Procedure:
 - 1. Protest must be in writing and signed by the party or parties making the protest and filed with the Senior Fairboard office by noon of the day following the incident being protested. A \$100 non-refundable fee must accompany the protest.
 - 2. Senior Fairboard Executive Board will review the protest with the accused, accuser, and any other needed parties before reaching a decision.
 - 3. A judge's decision on class placement cannot be protested.

Poultry Department

Monday @ 5:30 pm

1. All market turkeys, chickens, and gamebirds must show documentation from an NPIP hatchery or have a negative pullorum test within ninety days of the start of the fair.
2. Waterfowl are not required but preferred to come from an NPIP hatchery.
3. All poultry will be leg banded for identification purposes on Sunday.
4. Minimum weight limit per chicken is four pounds. Not eligible for the champion if underweight.
5. Minimum weight for a Tom is eighteen pounds, and a Hen is thirteen pounds. Not eligible for the champion if underweight.
6. Fancy and/or hens & pullets chicken classes must be APA approved breeds. Non APA approved breeds cannot place higher than fourth in their respective class.
7. Show attire must be a white long-sleeved button-up shirt or a white lab coat.
8. All poultry projects require a poultry book, project, and record book. Each species must have separate record pages, feed tag, weight, and learning experiences (written). Work must be shown individually for each species; otherwise, it will not be eligible for awards, including the Outstanding Exhibitor.

Goat Department

Tuesday @ 5:00 pm

1. All goats must have some sort of permanent identification. Market goats must have a scrapie tag. Breeding, dairy, and pygmy are preferably registered and have tattoos in both ears; if they are not, they also must have a scrapie tag.
2. Market goats may be does or wethers.
3. Minimum weight limit for market goat is forty pounds. Not eligible for the champion if underweight.
4. Breeding does may have horns; all other goat projects must be dehorned and smooth healed.
5. No bucks permitted.
6. Dairy goat exhibitor “show whites” are required, meaning a white shirt and white pants.

Sheep Department

Tuesday, 15 minutes after the end of the Goat Show

1. All sheep must have a Scrapie ID.
2. All market lambs exhibited must be slick shorn no earlier than two weeks before the start of the fair.
3. All poultry will be leg banded for identification purposes on Sunday.
4. Minimum weight for market sheep is ninety pounds. Not eligible for the champion if underweight.
5. Maximum of three market lambs per exhibitor. No more than two of either sex (wether or ewe).
6. No rams permitted.
7. Breeding ewes must be less than one year in age.

Rabbit Department

Wednesday @ 10:00 am

1. All rabbits must be tattooed before arriving at the fair.
2. Show attire must be a white long-sleeved button-up shirt or a white lab coat.
3. Pen of market rabbits must be of the same breed and not weigh less than three pounds and no more than five and a half pounds each. Not eligible for champion if any of these requirements are not met.
4. A maximum of five breeding rabbits per exhibitor, with no more than 2 per class.
5. The judge will determine participants for the fur class.
6. Rabbits can only be shown in either market or breeding classes, but may be shown in showmanship.

Cattle Department

Wednesday @ 5:00 pm

1. All cattle must have a halter and necktie on at all times in the barn.
2. All projects must be dehorned and smooth healed.
3. Only mulch bedding is permitted; wood shavings are allowed on the day of shows only.
4. All steers must demonstrate evidence of permanent castration (i.e., testicular removal, banding). Any animal using the banding method must have completed 30 days before the start of the fair. Any steer showing evidence of testicular tissue, as determined by the Senior Fairboard and official veterinarian, will immediately be removed from the grounds.
5. Starting in 2026, all projects must have an 840 EID tag. If the project does not already have one, one will be provided at the fair.
6. Dairy Beef Feeder calves must not weigh less than three hundred and fifty pounds and no more than seven hundred pounds. Not eligible for champion if any of these requirements are not met.
7. Dairy Beef Feeders must be 100% dairy or crossbred dairy breeds only. Crossbred with beef breeds will be shown in the Beef Feeder show. This will be determined by the Department Heads and Senior Fairboard Directors in charge.
8. Beef Feeder calves must not weigh less than two hundred and fifty pounds and no more than seven hundred pounds. Not eligible for champion if any of these requirements are not met.
9. Beef steers and heifers are eligible to show as a beef project.

Swine Department

Thursday @ 5:00 pm

1. Starting in 2026, all market projects must have an 840 EID tag. If the project does not already have one, one will be provided at the fair.
2. No slick clipping or body shaving of pigs except on the ears and tails.
3. No oil or oil-like dressing will be permitted. Water is an acceptable dressing.
4. Canes, whips, and plastic pipes are acceptable for driving the hogs.
5. Maximum of three market hogs per exhibitor. No more than two of either sex (barrow or gilt).
6. No boars permitted.
7. Breeding:
 - a. Gilts must be born on or after December 1st of the preceding year.
 - b. Crossbred gilts will show by declared weight, youngest to oldest.
 - c. Must be a minimum of five purebred gilts to have a purebred class. If more than 11 purebred gilts, classes will be made according to age, from youngest to oldest.
 - d. All purebred gilts must have registration papers identifying their name and/or Farm (Team) name they are a part of. This should be easily identifiable on the registration papers. Litter records will be accepted through NSR, CPS, or the American Berkshire Association.
 - e. If fewer than five purebred gilts, crossbred, and purebred will show together based on declared weight, from youngest to oldest.

Showmanship

Director in Charge: Mark Thomas, Shane Warner, Nick Bruns

Coordinators: Species Department Heads

Daily during the species show

- A. Purpose: Is to encourage exhibitors to acquire skills and know-how in proper handling of animals and to obtain information and practice in fitting and grooming animals for the show.
- B. Eligibility: Exhibitors who are exhibiting market or breeding animals.
- C. Rules:
 - 1. Showmanship classes are broken down based on age as of January 1:
 - 1a. Junior: Ages 8-12
 - 1b. Intermediate: Ages 13-15
 - 1c. Senior: Ages 16-19
 - 2. During the contest, exhibitors may be asked by the judge to show another exhibitor's animal.
 - 3. The animal used for showmanship must be entered and shown by the exhibitor in the respective breeding or market class in the Junior Fair. Exceptions can be made in extreme circumstances at the discretion of the Directors in Charge and the Department Head.
 - 4. Dress code: Showman must wear closed-toed shoes with no rips, tears, or holes, a collared polo or buttoned shirt with some sleeves, and nice blue or black jeans or tan khakis. No rips or cut-offs, no tank tops, t-shirts, or sleeveless tops. Review department-specific rules for additional requirements.
 - 5. Overview of Criteria for Judging Showmanship Contest: Consider these major points of emphasis.
 - 5a. The judge has final determination.
 - 5b. The judge will observe the general all-around ability and know-how the contestant demonstrates in the training and handling of animals, as well as how they present their animal.
 - 5c. The judge will be looking for contestants with the know-how to handle themselves in the show ring.
 - 5d. The judge will be looking for evidence that the contestants know how to fit and groom an animal.
 - 5e. The judge will appraise the contestant's knowledge and use of good show ring etiquette as demonstrated by the equipment used and skill in using it.
- D. Showmanship Classes Order for All Departments:
 - 1. Senior Showmanship: ages 16-19
 - 2. Intermediate Showmanship: ages 13-15
 - 3. Junior Showmanship: ages 8-12
 - 4. Overall Showman, first place from each division

Friday: During Auction

- A. Purpose: This is designed to acknowledge the exhibitors' accomplishments not only in the show ring, but also in their knowledge and understanding of their species.
- B. Eligibility: Exhibitors who participate in livestock market classes and have completed their projects.
- C. Rules:
 - 1. To be eligible for the Outstanding Market Exhibitor, the exhibitor must participate in the Skillathon, Showmanship, and Market class and have their record book judged during the fair.
 - 2. The record book must be an approved 4-H or FFA record-keeping system.
 - 3. Rankings will be assigned points according to the following scale:
 - 3a. Skillathon: 30%
 - 3b. Showmanship: 25%
 - 3c. Record book: 25%
 - 3d. Market class: 20%
 - 4. Tie Breakers: If a tie exists, there will be a new identical Skillathon question asked of each youth.
 - 5. The Outstanding Market Exhibitor of each livestock department will sell first in their respective department of the Livestock Sale.



Showmanship Sweepstakes

Friday: 9 a.m.-12 p.m.

- A. Purpose: Friendly competition designed to acknowledge each department's best showman and give them an opportunity to compete against the other winners to determine who cannot only show their species the best but who can show all the species the best.
- B. Eligibility: Exhibitors must have participated in the Overall Showman for their respective department.
- C. Rules:
 - 1. Each participant is only eligible to represent one department per year. If the individual has won multiple Overall Showman departments in the same year, they must decide which department to represent. If the runner-up cannot compete, the third-place individual will be eligible.
 - 2. Species Overall Showman must notify Coordinators by 10:00 am the day after the show of their decision to participate.
 - 3. Previous Showmanship Sweepstakes Champions are not eligible to compete again, but previous non-champions are eligible.
 - 4. The contest will require each individual to show the correct showmanship techniques for the respective department species. Showman will show every species.
 - 5. The judge will place the participants one through seven, with one being the best and seven being the worst. The participant with the lowest combined score of all species will be the Showman Sweepstakes Champion.
 - 6. In the case of a tie, the participants will draw one species and show the respective animals to break the tie. The tiebreaker species cannot be one of the species the participants represent.
 - 7. Each department head is responsible for obtaining animals for the contest. All animals used in the contest will be chosen from the department's eligible animals. Owners' consent must be obtained before an animal can be used for the contest. The owner or a representative must be present during the animal's use. A participant will not be allowed to use their own animal or a family member's animal during the contest, but their animal can be used by other participants if necessary.
 - 8. Exhibitors are to conduct themselves in a professional manner. Showman will treat all animals humanely. No foul language, poor sportsmanship, or sideline coaching will be permitted. Exhibitors can be disqualified at any time.
 - 9. Dress code for the competition will be nice blue or black jeans or tan khaki pants with no rips, cuts, or holes. Closed-toed boots are required. An event T-shirt will be provided.
 - 10. The Showman Sweepstakes Champion will receive a belt buckle, and each participant will receive a rosette corresponding to their placing in the contest.

Livestock Auction

Director in Charge: Shane Warner

Friday: 1 p.m.

- A. Purpose: Youth and their projects to be recognized for their hard work and have businesses and individuals support their projects.
- B. Eligibility: Exhibitors who participate in livestock market classes and have completed their projects.
- C. Rules:
 - 1. To be eligible for auction, the animal must have been shown in its market class.
 - 2. Exhibitors are responsible for soliciting buyers for the auction. Letters, brochures, and add-on sheets are available for exhibitors to send to potential buyers.
 - 3. It is highly encouraged that exhibitors include a personalized letter to potential buyers.
 - 4. Checks for all champion animals will be held pending the drug testing results from the Ohio Department of Agriculture.
 - 5. Auction checks must be deposited ninety days from the date on the check. No checks will be reissued.
 - 6. All animals in the auction are available for purchase unless otherwise stated in the Auction Program.
 - 7. Grand & Reserve Champion Junior & Senior hanging baskets and potted planters are eligible to go through the auction and become the property of the buyer.
 - 8. All changes regarding the destination and auction of animals must be notified by the Director in Charge or Coordinator by Thursday at 12 p.m.
 - 9. Exhibitors are permitted to bring all market animals through the auction with the exception of market Sheep & Swine. They are permitted to bring up to two of each species.
 - 10. Exhibitors must be present when their animal goes through the auction.
 - 11. Exhibitors are responsible for writing and mailing thank-you notes to all their buyers. The auction committee will post thank-you lists on Sunday.
 - 12. All exhibitors, animals, and plants will enter the show ring for the auction.
 - 13. Official Sale Weight is considered the weight of the animal as determined at weigh-in.
 - 14. All sales are final.
 - 15. The person requesting or taking a bidder's number is ultimately responsible for all charges pertaining to that number.
 - 16. All bills must be paid within sixty days or will incur a two percent monthly fee on the first of each month until paid in full.
 - 17. The auction committee is not responsible for damage or loss of the animal.
 - 18. Payments must be made in full before the animal is released from the grounds.
 - 19. Sale order of species rotates every year.
